Centered around the theme "Redefining Public Health: Harnessing Innovation, Collaboration, and Equity for Resilient Public Health Systems," the conference offered a space for exploring real-world solutions to contemporary health issues. Experts and participants from across disciplines engaged in conversations on how innovation, community partnerships, and equitable policies can drive long-term improvements in health systems. Sessions highlighted the integration of research into practice, the role of data and technology, and the importance of inclusive health planning. This exchange of knowledge and experience strengthened global networks and opened doors for future research, joint initiatives, and impactful collaborations.

### RESEARCH PRESENTATIONS

Key highlight of the conference was the extensive range of highquality research papers presented by seasoned academics, students, practitioners and industry representatives. These contributions underscored the conference's commitment to academic excellence and real-world applicability, offering insights that bridged theory, policy, and practice. Paper Presentations covered a broad spectrum of topics, including, but not limited to;

Primary Health Care, Epidemiology, Communicable Diseases, Non - Communicable Diseases, Mental Health, Maternal and Infant Health Sexual and Reproductive Health, Adolescent and Young Adults Health, Nutrients and Dietetics, Health Communication and Health Information Technology, Health Economics, Occupational Health and Safety.

Sessions were structured to encourage critical engagement, with many presentations followed by in-depth Q&A segments, encouraging meaningful dialogue among participants. In addition to standard Q&A, each technical session included a dedicated time slot known as Technical Dialogue, a structured discussion space designed to promote collective reflection and cross-presentation synthesis. These segments provided an opportunity for presenters to engage in shared discussions on emerging themes, methodological challenges, and policy implications raised by the session's papers.

### **Priority SDGs:**



ICOPH conference series is firmly committed to supporting the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through evidence-based dialogue and actionable insights. Each session, paper, and technical discussion is designed to not only raise awareness but also drive tangible progress across health-related goals.



### **Priority SDG**

Sessions on Nutrients and Dietetics explored strategies to address malnutrition, food insecurity, and sustainable dietary practices. These discussions directly support efforts to achieve food security and improved nutrition globally.



### **Priority SDG**

Presentations and dialogues at the conference highlighted the intersection of clean water access, sanitation, and disease prevention. The discussions recognized that inadequate water and hygiene are fundamental drivers of public health issues, especially in vulnerable communities. Effective water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) strategies were underscored as essential to public health.



### **Priority SDG**

From communicable and non-communicable diseases to mental health and maternal care, the conference addressed comprehensive health topics. The multidisciplinary focus reinforced the need for integrated health systems and policy responses.



### **Priority SDG**

Health disparities were a recurring theme across many sessions, with a focus on marginalized populations such as adolescents, migrants, and low-income groups. Research emphasized the importance of inclusive health policies and equitable access to services. ICOPH served as a platform to explore how public health interventions can reduce systemic inequalities.



### **Priority SDG**

The conference acknowledged the growing health impacts of climate change, including rising infectious diseases, heat-related illnesses, and food insecurity. Public health experts presented adaptive strategies and policy responses to climate-related health threats. These insights stressed the urgency of integrating climate resilience into public health planning.



### **Priority SDG**

ICOPH fostered collaboration between academia, governments, NGOs, and the private sector, highlighting the value of cross-sectoral partnerships in achieving global health goals. Technical Dialogue sessions encouraged shared learning and joint problem-solving. This collaborative spirit reflected the essence of SDG 17, strengthening partnerships for sustainable development.

### "Empowering the Global South, Engaging the World: Building Bridges in Public Health"

Organized by The International Institute of Knowledge Management (TIIKM) based in Sri Lanka, ICOPH exemplifies how the Global South is increasingly shaping global public health conversations. While the majority of participants and organizers represent nations from the Global South, the conference welcomes insights and expertise from around the world, including the Global North. This cross-regional collaboration not only contributes to narrowing gaps in global health knowledge, but also encourage mutual respect and long-term partnerships. ICOPH is proud to be a bridge connecting diverse regions in pursuit of a healthier, more equitable world.



### **Global Reach:**

This year, ICOPH brought together a vibrant and diverse community from across 54 countries, with more than 800 papers submitted by participants representing over 100 universities, as well as government institutions and independent research bodies.

This diversity of voices enriched the dialogue, fostering globally relevant and locally grounded insights into the evolving landscape of public health.






